




HOME LEARNING

Reading

PHONICS

Mrs Terrell's group (FROGS)

Please carry on recognising your Speed Sounds every day, so you do not forget them! Keep watching Ruth Miskin lessons.

Keep practising writing them correctly using the little phrases, such as 'slither down the snake,' and 'down the long leg!'

Keep 'Fredtalking.' You can 'Fredtalk' during the day, e.g. "Do you want to hear me s-i-ng, sing?"

Can you choose a letter sound and look for it in a book? How many can you find on a page? Ask a family member to choose some simple 3 letter words for you to read and write using your phonics skills. E.g. y-e-s, yes!

Have a go! You c-a-n, can do it!

Miss Dallamore's group (TADPOLES)

Activity 1 - Use your voice to make sounds like a car, a dog, a ghost, a train and bubbles under water.

Activity 2 - Teach an adult Old McDonald had a farm. What animals will be in your song? What noises do the animals make?

Activity 3 - Charlotte the Chef is making some silly sound soup! Each soup needs 3 ingredients that start with the same sound. She has already made 'c' sound soup with carrots, cauliflower and cheese. Can you think of 3 food to put in the 'o' soup?

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Can you work together as a team with your family to complete a scavenger hunt?



Physical Development

Fine Motor

Use scissors and practice cutting different sizes, shapes and weights of paper and card to develop your accurate cutting skills!

Gross Motor

Can you play 'Follow the leader' with your family and move in lots of different ways?

(e.g. walking, running, hopping, skipping, crawling, jumping, shuffling, slithering, rolling etc.)

Health and Self Care

Keep washing your hands really well with soap and count to 20!

Communication and Language

(Linked to P.S.E.D.)

Can you follow the instructions in the Scavenger Hunt and tell your family where you find the items on the list using words, such as 'under,' 'on top,' 'behind,' 'between,' 'in,' 'beside' etc.

Literacy (Reading)

Listen to 'RUMBLE IN THE JUNGLE' online (a book by Giles Andreae, read aloud by Books Read Aloud for Kids) and enjoy listening to the rhymes.

Which jungle animal rhyme is your favourite? Why?

Literacy (Writing)

Frogs phonics group

Draw your favourite wild, jungle animal and label it.

Have a go at writing a list of wild animals using your phonics skills

e.g. lion

snake

tiger

(Parents, don't worry if your child has a go and it isn't spelt correctly. They might want to write tiger and write 'tgr.' Praise them for writing the sounds they can hear, especially the initial, first sound in the word. Please send me photos of their independent writing. I would love to see how they are using their phonics.)

Tadpoles phonics group

Draw your favourite wild, jungle animal.

Practise writing your name

Mathematics

(Have you got any chalk?)

Ask someone in your family to help you to draw a hopscotch grid and you can write the numbers.

Play hopscotch and practise counting. You could also play

'What's the Time Mr. Wolf?'

Practise subitising by rolling a dice and shouting out the number of spots as fast as you can by recognising the pattern, not counting the spots. Then do the same number of steps, claps or jumps.

(Remember, you can count claps and jumps as well as things like apples, cars and dinosaurs!)

Can you throw a stone or a stick onto your hopscotch grid, say the number it lands on, and then say the number that is 'one more.'

Use a Google search or Alexa to find out about wild, jungle animals.

Use Google Chrome to create a photo of you and a wild animal in your home!!

Expressive Arts and Design

Sing Nursery songs and rhymes daily!

There are some Nursery songs with a wild animal theme you could sing, such as 'One elephant went out to Play' and '5 Little Monkeys sitting in a tree, along came a crocodile as quiet as can be...,'

Practise your fine motor skills by colouring in carefully. You could print off your favourite jungle animal pictures to colour in or carefully colour your own pictures in.

How do I view 3D animals on Google?

To use the feature, you'll need to google an animal, for example: 'giant panda'.

Just underneath the image search results and the Wikipedia description of the panda, you'll be able to see a little box that says, "Meet a life-sized giant panda up close".

Click the 'view in 3D' button, then click 'view in your space' to see the panda in your own surroundings.

You'll need to give Google access to your camera for it to be able to insert the panda into your space.

What animals can you find?

There are loads of different animals you can see through the feature. It first gained popularity when people realised they could see a huge 3D panda when they googled the animal - but there's a huge list of animals the feature works for.

You can also find a:

- Lion
- Tiger
- Cheetah
- Shark
- Hedgehog
- Emperor penguin
- Wolf
- Snakes
- Eagle
- Brown bear
